

Richland Gets Easy 25-7 Win

Richland's 1950 football edition functioned like a well-oiled, mid-season 11 Friday night. Displaying a strong ground attack they hammered alternately at the Wenatchee middle and ends to wind out 338 yards by rushing. After trailing 7-6 at the end of the first half the Bombers came back with three touchdowns in rapid order to win easily 25-7. The only false note of the entire Richland attack was the three missed kicks for extra points. The Bomber backfield fumbled the ball three times, and each time the Panther were there to roll on it. It was a double fumble by Jack Morrow, fullback, and Harry Scott, halfback, that set up the first scoring play of the game. The fumble opened the second quarter and was recovered by Wenatchee. Then the Panthers uncorked their famed Valley reverse and it sent Dewey Keith, 58 ft halfback, scampering 58 yards for a touchdown. That was the biggest threat the visitors were able to engineer in the time.

Richland's ground game forged out 72 yards in a straight drive that sent fullback Jack Morrow plunging over from the six for the first Bomber touchdown of the year. Bob Marcum's try for point was wide.

MIDDLE AND ENDS

It was the combination of Morrow and Bill Tracy in the Richland backfield that proved to be the stunner. Morrow slashed savagely through the Wenatchee middle, while Tracy kept the Panthers guessing by winging around the ends and firing passes. This dual threat threw the Wenatchee defense wide open.

Offensively Wenatchee seemed to have five men in the backfield most of the night. Only the fifth player usually turned out to be Clarence Fulcher, Richland guard. The all conference lineman was also instrumental in opening up big holes for the Bomber backfield. Starring with Fulcher in the line were Jerry Marzyck at tackle and Don Foelker at center.

Morrow turned out to be the biggest surprise package of the night. Bob Marcum opened at the fullback post but left midway in the first quarter when a smash to his knee, the same one that sidelined him part of last season, took him out of the game. Morrow came in to substitute for Marcum and his terrific smashing more than compensated for the loss of the big starter.

TWO FOR MORROW

Richland's second touchdown came on the end of a 55 yard drive, and again it was Morrow that plowed over from the six. This time Marcum's kick split the uprights.

A partially blocked Wenatchee punt that wound up on the Panther 25 yard stripe set up the third touchdown for the winners. Fleet Bill Tracy took the ball

on the first play and swept wide around his own right end and went all the way standing up.

Coach Francis Rish set in an entirely new backfield to finish out the game. But you wouldn't have thought they were substitutes the way they handled the ball. A pair of backs by the names of Tom McKewen and Bob Flake paced Richland in a 53 yard drive that was finished when Flake slipped around the end from the three yard line.

Wenatchee's backs were willing, but lack of support in the line proved to be their downfall. Jess Grayhill and Dewey Keith appeared to be better than average leather luggers but most of the time they were going it alone. However, their pet play the Valley reverse had the Bombers fooled most of the time.
