### Another Tremendous Season For Bombers

Richland's Bombers brushed aside the big book of the Yakima Pirates press clippings and when they did they found just another victim of the hard pounding Bomber ground and aerial assault.

Yakima apparently forgot to check up on three things before their defeat at the hands of Richland Friday night. They were:

(1) The amazing running and pass catching display put on by a scat back by the name of Harry Scott.

(2) The pitching accuracy of Bill Tracy, another flyweight in the Bomber backfield.

(3) A hard driving fullback by the name of Jack Morrow who pounded across the Pirate goal line for the vital extra points.

Here's what these three did to wreck the Yakima dreams of an easy conquest. Scott caught two of Tracy's passes and rambled across the goal line both times. They were the first two TD's for the Bombers. Then when the Richland drive seemed to be stalled late in the third quarter Scott broke loose and

wiggled his way 16 yards to score the third time. Morrow put his head down and bent the Pirate line the last two times for the difference between a tie and a victory.

Of course there were eight other players on the Richland team and a few that Yakima doesn't care to talk about. The name of Clarence Fulcher, guard, and Jerry Marzyck, tackle, should call for heavy doses of aspirin whenever the Pirates hear them mentioned. These two spent so much time in the Yakima backfield that it wouldn't have been surprising to see them called in to the huddle. Yakima might as well have done it. They couldn't make any yardage through them anyhow.

#### DAWSON'S GREAT PLAY

But the victory didn't look that easy and it wasn't. Yakima struck quickly, scoring on the third play carrying 63 yards across the Richland goal line. But their attempted kick was wide. They ran the score to 12-0 midway in the second period when Hurst took a handoff on a reverse and went 31 yards.

Then Tracy and Scott teamed up for their pair to send Richland ahead as Morrow made his first conversion running play good.

But for a magnificent play by Bomber end Jack Dawson, the score might have been different. On the last play of the third quarter Hurst broke loose on a 53 yard run to the goal line. He was in the clear when Dawson, galloping up from the rear hauled Hurst down on the Richland 10.

With the count third down and 10 still to go Yakima attempted a sweep of their left end but the pitchout went over Hurst's head and he wound up back on the 26.

It was quite a reversal of last year's game when Yakima had everything their own way and it struck a severe blow at the Pirate grid reputation.

For Richland it was their seventh victory against one defeat this year, thus for the past two years Richland has lost but two games, tied one, and won 15.
