But quoting statistics is not the answer. They only prove that hunting accidents are avoidable. They point out with deadly clarity that hunting accidents are the result of unthinking actions on the part of the person hnadling the gun. They tell a story of carelessness.

The unfortunate victim of gun carelessness, popularly referred to as a hunting accident, is not the only one who pays a terrible price. The one who held the gun cannot easily forget the remorse and bitter self-recrimination which he must live with for years to come.
