

Pasco, Richland In Big Clash Tonight

Three PCL Loop Games Are Slated

West Coast gridders, most of them toughened in intersectional battle, move against each other Saturday in three Pacific Coast Conference games.

Washington clashes with Oregon in Seattle and Washington State invades Los Angeles to meet UCLA. California, a surprise 14-0 victor over highly rated Pittsburgh last week, takes on Oregon State at Corvallis.

John Brodie and other Stanford Indians host San Jose State and Idaho plays Arizona State in non-conference tilts. Powerful Southern Cal, winner over Texas, Oregon State and Wisconsin, is idle. Oregon bowed 6-0 to UCLA last week and probably will have a rough time with Washington. The Huskies dumped Illinois 28-13.

The Washington State Cougars, who lead the nation in passing offense, were pronounced ready for UCLA. Cougar Coach Jim Sutherland said his players, who have passed for 790 yards in three games, are in good shape and improving. They have defeated San Jose and Idaho, lost to Stanford. UCLA's Coach Red Sanders has been drilling his Bruins on penalties. UCLA has been penalized 50 yards in three games. The Bruins lost 42-13 to Michigan and won 13-7 from Utah.

Four California first-stringers will be sidelined at Corvallis. Quarterback Gus Gianulias, ends Tom Wheatcroft and Roger Ramerier and halfback John Stewart are out with injuries. The Bears will have a weight advantage in the line against Oregon State. USC lost 14-13 to Iowa last week, but defeated Missouri 19-13. USC beat Oregon State 21-13.

Brodie, the nation's No. 1 college thrower, has only one of Stanford's four top ends to throw against San Jose State—Carl Isaacs. Gary Van Galder, Jerry Beattie and Joel Freis are out with injuries.

Idaho Coach Skip Stahley, looking for the first win, suffered another disappointment yesterday when senior fullback Warren Hawley broke a leg. The squad was reduced to 29.

Defending champion Cary Middlecoff of Dallas shot a 2-under-par 70 in his opening round to stay within easy reach of the front-running Californians who burned up the windy Presidio course in 4 under par yesterday.

The starting field of 162 was whacked for the second round, with 25 of the lesser lights sidelined, as Chula Vista professional Bill Casper and Alameda amateur Johnny McMullin set out to show whether their initial 68s were flashes in the pan, or whether this was their time to take the big name contingent.

Right up there, with a 69 for a starter, was pro Don January, Lampasa, Tex., former North Texas State College ace. He won the Dallas Centennial Tournament, a \$6,000 show, last May and is the 18th ranking money winner among the pros.

Last year in Washington, 36 persons were victims of someone's carelessness with a gun and 7 of these will never hunt again. They are dead and it could happen to you.

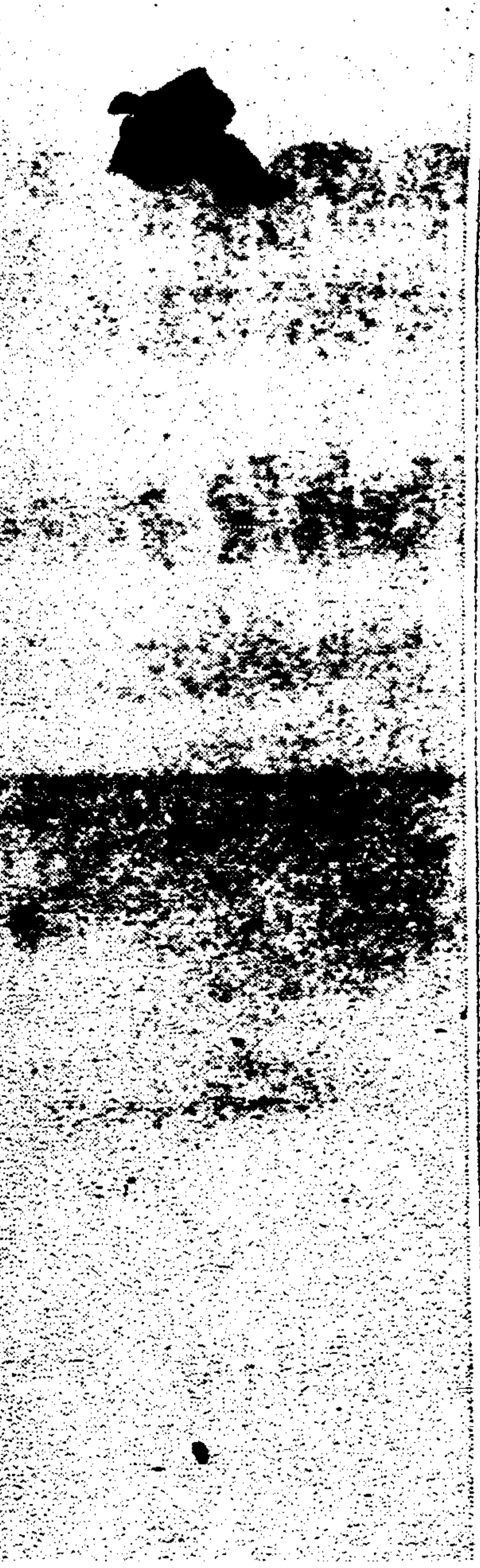
True, when one considers that some 300,000 persons were afield with their guns, the relatively small number who became hunting season casualties doesn't look very startling. But even one death or injury at the hands of a careless hunter is too many.

The National Rifle Association has conducted long and exhaustive research into how and why hunting accidents occur and it all points toward the fact that accidents are the result of their own or someone else's carelessness.

But quoting statistics is not the answer. They only prove that hunting accidents are avoidable. They point out with deadly clarity that hunting accidents are the result of unthinking actions on the part of the person handling the gun. They tell a story of carelessness.

The unfortunate victim of gun carelessness, popularly referred to as a hunting accident, is not the only one who pays a terrible price. The one who held the gun cannot easily forget the remorse and bitter self-recrimination which he must live with for years to come.

A gun is made for one basic purpose, it is made to kill. Will your gun kill game only?



Weather Crimps WSC Drill

PULLMAN—The weather put a crimp in the final two practice sessions of the Washington State Cougars who are preparing for their rough contest with the UCLA Bruins.

Coach Jim Sutherland took his charges into the Memorial field house Thursday when a rainy afternoon turned the practice field into a sloppy mess. A thick fog accompanied the rain and made passing a hazardous business.

Sutherland concentrated on running plays in the afternoon in an effort to offset the very potent passing attack. He thinks coach Red Sanders of the Bruins will have his defenses set for the aerials of Bunny Aldrich and Bob Newman. A strong ground game will make the passing just that much more dangerous.

Fullbacks Ed Stevens and Jim Frankson were running well off the newly found power of the run and big wholes were opened in the third string line that was filling in for the UCLA forward wall.

Every back on the squad also saw action in the pass pattern drill stressed to split the defenses of coach Sanders. UCLA is rated as one of the top defensive elevens on the coast this year.

Kennewick Traveling To Yakima For Game

The Pasco - Richland game in times past has always been a big and important one on the local prep schedule and tonight will be no exception.

The two teams, boasting identical records against almost the same foes, will play at the Richland Bomber Bowl at 8 p.m. Kennewick, the other Tri-City school travels to Yakima tonight for a conference game with the Pirates.

Kennewick's game tonight will be the first in conference play for the Lions, who cracked into the win column with a 26-6 win last week.

It will mark the first time Yakima and Kennewick have played since 1952 when the Lions took one of its worst beatings in football history. The game ended with Yakima on top, 60-0.

While Kennewick and Yakima renew a rivalry which is expected to be a permanent fixture in valley prep football, a huge crowd is expected at the Bomber Bowl to see Pasco and Richland play.

Richland, boasting the home field advantage for whatever it is worth, will be the favorite against the Bulldogs. However, on records, both teams have two wins over Oregon rivals, and both have lost to league-leading Walla Walla.

Richland was defeated by the Blue Devils by one touchdown last week: Pasco lost by two touchdowns in its season opener two weeks ago.

The Bombers, bolstered by 225-pound John Meyers, and not having a lineman under 165, will have a weight advantage. And Richland too, has slightly heavier backs. Smallest man on the field tonight will be Pasco quarterback, Dick Davidson, who tips the scales at 145.

Coach Francis Rish of Richland, realizing he is being favored, looks for a tough battle tonight between the two teams. "It always has been in the past," Rish noted.

Richland won the last clash between the two teams, 6-0. Pasco's last victory over Richland came in 1953 when Em Morgan's Bulldogs were undefeated. With present Air Force academy quarterback Eddie Rosane directing operations, the Bulldogs won 26-13.

There will be one change in the lineup tonight among the Bombers. George Stephens will start at quarterback spot replacing Dwayne Muller. This is probably an indication that Richland plans to rely heavily on an aerial attack.

Coach Vern Tucker of Kennewick will be traveling to Yakima with a team in better shape than any time this season. Back in the lineup is Mike Martin, end and linebacker, the softspoken Texan from Beaumont. Two players pick-

ed up broken beaks in practice this week, and will be playing with bird cages across their faces. They are Marv Marchbanks, Tucker's leading pass snagger and run-back man, and Gene Lanham, fullback.

During the week, Tucker re-adjusted his offensive patterns in hopes of getting more ground-gaining efficiency from his players.

CBC Hawks Travel To Bremerton

The Columbia Basin College Hawks, with a tie on the record, but no wins, travel to Bremerton Saturday night for its fourth game of the season.

It will be a junior college conference tilt.
