The Richland Bombers should have their ammunition all ready to fire this weekend, but the Kennewick Lions are hoping a couple of their players have their claws back, and all develop molasses fingers.

Friday night, Richland rolled all over the Lions to shut them out, 33-0, the second week in a row the Kennewick eleven has gone scoreless.

The Bombers rolled up their usual three touchdown lead before substituting, then threw in the second unit. And without a program, you could hardly tell the difference.

Where Danny Neth, Bill Johnson and Kenney Ryan had been ripping the Kennewick line apart, with the aid of some excellent blocking, it became the enjoyable task for Robert Kenner, Jock Cameron and George Mulligan to tear off the yardage in large doses. Enjoyable, that is, for the Richland players.

For Kennewick, one of the biggest blows came an hour and 15 minutes before game time. That was when Jim Monasmith walked into the dressing room and announced he was on doctor's orders not to play.

That left Coach Vern Tucker with no choice at quarterback. The only player he could use was one who has been out most of the past three weeks with an injury, and has seen practically no time at quarterback this season — Ole Olds. To the credit of Olds, who did some quarterbacking last year, he accepted without hardly a murmur.

Operating under the belief Monasmith would be ready, Tucker had allowed Marc McGinnis to play two quarters in the junior varsity game Thursday night, so could not use the regular reserve QB until the second half.

It probably would have made little difference, anyway, considering the mood the Bombers were in. Though they didn't score their first touchdown until mid-way in the second period, right from the first those fleet and smashing Richland backs began knocking through the Kennewick line.

Once again, fumbles also hurt the Lions. The first occurred just after the Lions did something accidently they have been trying to do on purpose for the past two seasons — recover an onside kick.

Friday night they did it on the opening kickoff, as the boot slipped cff the side of the kicker's foot and a Lion pounced on it on the Richland 46.

Two plays later the Lions fumbled and Richland gained control. The Lions stopped that drive, and another before they fumbled again,

Mulligan plunged through right guard for seven yards for the second, after Richland recovered another fumble on the 11.

Just four players later, Mulligan whipped nine yards around right end for the final TD. A fumble also set that one up for the Bombers, when the kickoff was bobbled.
