Richland's Bombers blasted the John Rogers Pirates out of the Bomber Bowl Friday night by a score of 26-14, while grinding out the year's best yardage total on the ground.

The Spokane team was unable to get its passing attack into gear until the second half when the Bombers allowed the passer plenty of time to get the ball away.

It looked like the Columbia High Bombers were off to the races after they took the opening kickoff and went 60 yards in four plays for a quick touchdown.

However, while the fans were still cheering that one, 180-pound

Jim Slawter took the Richland kickoff, cut to the right from his own 9-yard line and scored the turf for 91 yards and a TD. The kick was good and Spokane went out in front 7-6, with less than 2 minutes gone.

The blocking was devastating on the run back, but the Pirates never were able to do it again.

The Bombers came back quickly and had another touchdown before the end of the first quarter. The third TD came late in the second quarter when Billy Johnson turned the left corner from 12 yards out.

The second team went in when Johnson made the same play work for 23 yards, to within inches of the goal line. George Stephens, quarterback, carried it the remaining distance.

The reserves were unable to contain the passing of Norm Harding for the Pirates, who finally pitched one to Art Anderson from 11 yards out for their second touchdown.

Strong pressure on the passer is what held back the Pirates during the first half, and several times put them at a disadvantage with huge losses.

Again the story of the game can be written in the line, where the holes were opened for Johnson, Neth and Ryan, breaking them into the secondary.

Defensively, the Bombers looked good, except for their lapse which allowed Slawter to go 91 yards on the kickoff return. Kip Jones, Dwayne Muller and George Mulligan held the defensive secondary together, batting down passes and cracking runners hard.

Muller and Jones combined on one which sent Spokane end Jerry Skogstad to Kadlec Hospital for an overnight stay. Skogstad walked out of the hospital Saturday morning.

The game also cost the services of Ken Ryan, first string halfback for Richland, who received a fractured collarbone when he was tackled hard. Ryan will be unable to play in the last game of the season next week when the Bombers meet Bremerton at Richland. Coach Fran Rish said he probably would use Mulligan, a senior, and Jock Cameron, a junior.



CPS Beats Willamette

SALEM, Nov. 3 (AP) — Quarterback Dick Jarvis threw two touchdown passes and scored a third touchdown himself to lead College of Puget Sound to a 20-14 football win over Willamette today.

Willamette of the Northwest Conference delighted a homecoming crowd of 2,500 with a touchdown midway through the first quarter. Windy Sequeira scored it on a two-yard plunge.

It took Jarvis only two minutes to tie the score at 7-7. A four-yard pass to Larry Kelly accounted for the touchdown.

Then in the middle of the second quarter Jarvis climaxed a drive by the Evergreen Conference team by plunging over from the one.

Early in the third period he threw a 22-yard pass to Herb Rickey for what proved to be the winning touchdown.
