

# Bombers To Rest After Easy Win

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Richland's Bombers are facing an open date next weekend after swarming over the Hermiston Bulldogs at Hermiston Friday, 33-6.

However, they won't get much of a rest if Coach Fran Rish can avoid it. A rest would be the worst thing that could happen, Rish said, looking ahead to Oct. 5 when the Bombers go to Walla Walla for one of their toughest games on schedule.

Rish said he has been unable to schedule a game for next Friday, but probably would run the squad through a rough scrimmage.

At Hermiston Friday, the varsity squad played a total of about 16 minutes of the 48 in the game. Everyone in the 36-man traveling squad played in the game and some of the second string had more time in the game than the varsity members.

With speedy Bill Johnson back in the lineup after a bout with the flu, the Bombers opened up something of a passing game. Johnson tossed one to Norris Brown who got behind the double-teaming defenders and continued across the goal line for a 44-yard total. George Stephens, junior quarterback, heaved another to end Bill Hoyle who lateraled to Chuck Miller for another TD.

Rish said the Bombers haven't really opened up on the passes, throwing only seven Friday. We should throw 12 or more, he said. Every man in the varsity backfield is capable of throwing the ball, posing a constant threat.

As it did the week before, the Richland linemen delighted in opening up king-sized holes through which the backs scampered into the secondary. Johnson turned in runs of 58 and 39 yards and Kenny Ryan went for 60.

The Bombers, however, were not so precise as they were against Yakima the week before and Rish declared they had made a lot of mistakes which he will seek to iron out in practice. They were mental mistakes, he said.

Hermiston showed up with some tricky defensive maneuvers, but without much success. Offensively, they were stopped most of the time, but played alert ball and threatened to score more than once.

Early in the second quarter, Hermiston marched from its own 40 to the Bomber 19 before a pass interception ended the threat.

Then the Bulldogs grabbed a Bomber fumble and smashed down to the goal, lacking the final punch to put it over.

They got the score when Butch Shockman reached in front of Norris Brown to intercept a pass which he carried 20 yards into pay dirt, their only score.

In the third quarter, the Bulldogs grabbed another fumble on the Richland 27 and took it down to the 13 before Rish sent his varsity defenders back in.

## Whitworth Ups Streak

SPOKANE, Sept. 22 (AP) — The Whitworth Pirates ran their victory string to 19 today as they swept past the Willamette Bearcats 21-0 in the season opener for both teams.

Don Price threw to Bernie Rakes for one touchdown, Babe Bates rammed over for another and Vic Ferguson scored the third on an end run.

Willamette made its best showing on the ground, with Hawaiian import Eldredge Sequeira at 140 pounds, leading the way. The Bearcats penetrated to the Whitworth six inch line in the second quarter and then lost the ball on a fumble by fullback Chuck Koani.

Whitworth Coach Jim Louisberry didn't appear impressed by the way his team had kept the victory skein unbroken. He said more practice was needed on tackling and pass defense before the Evergreen Conference opener against Western Washington next Saturday.
